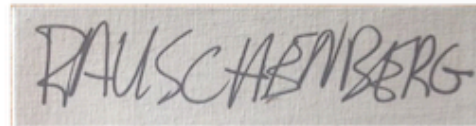


Rauschenberg 1928 - 2008

You will need:

Pritt stick/cellotape or masking tape

any junk mail/ newspaper/ magazine

piece of card/ inside cereal packet/ paper

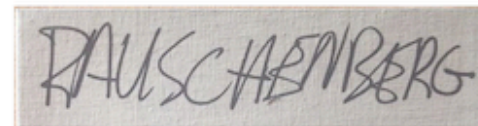
scissors

black marker pen/ any pen

Rauschenberg 1928 - 2008

He was well known for his 'Combines' in the 50s when he used to use none traditional materials and objects within his paintings. He questioned the difference between everyday objects and art objects

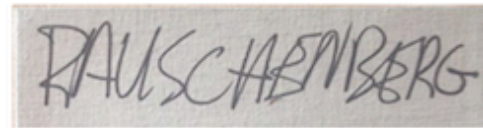
He was a painter and sculptor but he also worked with printmaking, photography and performance.



His paintings started to not only incorporate found objects but found imagery as well, through screen printing he was able to transfer the found images onto a screen and print them multiple times (that is why the prints look much flatter than his paintings).

Create a Rauschenberg type poster collage

- you could use the back of an envelope, cereal packet, card board from a box, piece of paper etc
- look through any junk mail, catalogues, post, newspaper/magazine images, yellow pages, flyers, old photographs
- tear or cut any images that look interesting
- tear or cut out any block colours and textures
- layer up a collage in his style
- add some colour if you like with felt tips/highlighters/pencil/biro
- Imagine your collage is for a poster - Rauschenberg's were often for an exhibition, event or concert he generally had his signature above the top and the rest of the details at the bottom with the event title, place and date

(in my example I put 'isolation series, London, at home, 1/4/20')
