Martin Luther King 57th anniversary March 2020

28th AUG 2020



Thousands are gathered in Washington DC to commemorate the 1963 civil rights March on Washington.

Tens of thousands of people gathered in Washington, DC on Friday to denounce racism, protest against police brutality and commemorate the anniversary of the 1963 civil rights march when Martin Luther King Jr made his famous "I Have a Dream" speech.

In his iconic address, King lamented "the unspeakable horrors of police brutality" and envisioned a reality, a future where his children would "one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the colour of their skin but by the content of their character".

Kimberly Jones, a Black woman from Illinois, was one of hundreds of marchers, lining up to enter the National Mall. "Fifty-seven years later we are still fighting that same fight, the fight for equality." Jones said. "It makes me sad and I'm so tired."



Civil rights activist Reverend Al Sharpton's National Action Network began planning for the march back in June in the wake of George Floyd's death. On Friday, he delivered the keynote address in front of the cheering crowd.

"The reason we had and still have to say Black Lives Matter ... we go to jail longer for the same crime like we don't matter, we get poverty, double the unemployment like we don't matter, we're treated with disrespect like we don't matter," he said.

"So we figured we'd let you know, Black Lives Matter and we won't stop until it matters to everybody."

"Every generation leaves behind a legacy. What that legacy will be is determined by the people of that generation. What legacy do you want to leave behind?" (*John Lewis US civil rights leader and politician.*)

I say to you today, my friends...even though we face the difficulties of today and tomorrow, I still have a dream. It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream. I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up, live out the true meaning of its creed: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal."

I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave-owners will be able to sit down together at the table of brother-hood. I have a dream that one day even the state of Mississippi, a state sweltering with the heat of injustice, sweltering with the heat of oppression, will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice.

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character. I have a dream...I have a dream that one day in Alabama, with its viscous racists, with its governor having his lips dripping with the words of interposition and nullification, one day right there in Alabama little black boys and black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls as sisters and brothers.

I have a dream today...I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, every hill and mountain shall be made low. The rough places will be made plain, and the crooked places will be made straight. And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together. This is our hope.

When we allow freedom to ring--when we let it ring from every city and every hamlet...we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual, "Free at last, Free at last, Great God a-mighty, We are free at last."


