IN GOOD HEALTH

CHARITIES, voluntary organisations and social enterprises are being offered the chance to apply for grants from one of the largest pots of funding for health projects in the country.

The £500,000 Healthier City and Hackney Fund combines money from the Council and City and Hackney Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG). It will encourage bids from local organisations proposing innovative solutions to health issues.

Core Sports, which is based in Homerton, already benefits from money allocated by the CCG Innovation Fund, one of the two

pots of money being merged to form the new fund – the other being the Council's Healthier Hackney Fund. Core Sports offers sport-specific and exercise classes, along with a weight management programme and health checks, to promote positive mental health.

Its manager, Laura-Jane Connelly, said: "Since 2015, we have engaged just over 700 people in City and Hackney with severe mental health needs and it's been really successful. We've seen how people have grown and blossomed within their own recovery from mental health."

Make Kit, a Hackney-based social enterprise producing affordable healthy recipe kits for

local residents, is supported by the Healthier Hackney Fund. It launched in May and, since then, has distributed over 600 recipe kits across the borough.

Georgina, a local Haggerston customer, said: "What I have learnt with Make Kit is portion size. I was cooking way too much and wasting a lot of food."

"I have also learnt new recipes and healthy alternatives."

Cllr Jonathan McShane, Cabinet Member for Health, Social Care and Devolution, said: "We are thrilled to be joining forces with the CCG on our new combined fund to improve the health and wellbeing of those living in Hackney and the City of London."

"The Healthier Hackney Fund and the CCG Innovation Fund have already produced encouraging results from organisations across the voluntary, community and social enterprise sectors using innovative solutions to local health issues. Working together increases our chances of finding forward-thinking ideas that will help us reach more people and improve health in both Hackney and the City of London."

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

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A GROUND-BREAKING new Hackney project to support vulnerable children and their families has already helped 36 families and been given a glowing review for the impact it is making.

The Family Learning Intervention Programme (FLIP) sees families invited on a break in a 'home from home' in a calm and peaceful rural environment.

The programme is aimed at families with children close to be taken into care or where there is a risk of family breakdown, and young people in long-term foster care where there is a risk of placement breakdown.

The programme provides families with time and space to develop the normal, healthy routines most families take for granted.

For example, they are supported to strengthen family relationships, build resilience and develop interests, skills and routines that will benefit them when they return home.

After launching the programme in rented accommodation, Hackney Council bought a property that has housed it since the beginning of the year.

One mother, who spent a week at the property with her teenage daughter after struggling with family relationships and communication, said: "I loved spending quality time with my daughter and seeing her so calm and relaxed.

"It was like I've had my little girl back for the week.

"Our workers were simply the best professionals I could possibly see myself spending time with; they were caring and patient.

"I've learned how to communicate with her and I feel positive about the future."

FLIP is funded by the Department for Education's Children's Social Care Innovation Programme.

A team of four staff are

based at the home with up to three families at a time.

The home was furnished with the help of Ikea Tottenham. An initial evaluation by external consultants Cordis Bright has proven positive.

It found the FLIP programme:

- Improved family relationships
- Reduced the likelihood of a breakdown in care
- Prevented children leaving the family setting and avoiding care admissions
- Increased emotional wellbeing in children and adolescents
- Reduced criminal offending, gang involvement and risk of child sexual exploitation

- More young people were less likely to run away or go missing
- Increased parenting confidence and aspirations
- Increased parent/carer resilience following the intervention.

Deputy Mayor of Hackney, Cllr Anntoinette Bramble, said: "Hackney has a reputation for being innovative and forward thinking when it comes to social work, and FLIP is a fantastic example of this in action.

"It might sound like an unusual approach, but the results are already speaking for themselves.

"Providing time away from home to focus on family relationships is an incredibly effective way of supporting children, young people and families on the edge of family breakdown.

"We're delighted with the results to date, and look forward to supporting many more families through the programme."

10k launch goes swimmingly

OLYMPIC diver Tom Daley brought traffic to a standstill when he helped launch the Shoreditch 10k, the first of a series of City Runs events organised by Adidas. The streets were closed to traffic on 8 October, as 5,000 runners warmed up with Daley and then raced past landmarks including Hoxton Street Market and Hoxton Square. Cop a look at restored Banksy

A WORK by street artist Banksy on a two-tonne wall has been painstakingly restored and returned to public view. Eleven specialists from the Fine Art Restoration Company took 16 weeks to restore the Curtain Road mural, called Snorting Copper. Originally created on the wall of a toilet in 2005, it became a tourist attraction before vandalism forced the Council to cover it up. When property developers Jonathan Ellis and David Kyte bought the building, it was rediscovered, removed and sent for restoration. This month, the piece – valued at £1.25million – was returned to Curtain Road, where it is now secured to the floor in a reinforced case.

Government urged to reform SEND funds

THE Deputy Mayor of Hackney has warned of a 'hidden education crisis' as a freeze in Government funding for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) means councils

in London are being forced to plug a funding gap of £100million. High needs funding, which allows local authorities to support young people with SEND, has effectively been frozen since 2011/12. In Hackney, there is a funding forecast shortfall of more than £6million.

To meet the shortfall, councils are using money from other education funding pots, and are drawing on reserves. Cllr Anntoinette Bramble, has written to the Secretary of State for Education, Justine Greening, urging her to reform this vital funding, arguing

the current system is not sustainable. Cllr Bramble said: "It is absolutely crucial that the Government changes the way that this vital funding is calculated and distributed, and take into account the growing demand."





More residents cycle to work in Hackney than any other London borough

DID YOU KNOW?

As the clocks go back and the nights draw in, cyclists and road users alike can get free bike maintenance and safety advice at a series of winter events.

First in the programme are two road safety events in Hackney Central to promote visibility for all road users. People can turn up and get advice on being more visible on the road at the 'Be Bright and Be Seen' event.

There will be lots of competitions with prizes to be won and free bike light sets given out. Cyclists and pedestrians will be asked to make sure they wear something bright or reflective on the road, while motorcyclists will be reminded to put their lights on, and everyone asked to watch out for each other.

The first 'Be Bright and Be Seen' event takes place on 23 October, from 12.30pm to 4.30pm, at Hackney Service Centre, 1 Hillman Street, with the second event on 25 October in Hackney Town Hall Square.

The Council's popular cycle pit stops are also back to help cyclists prepare for winter and through into spring.

A free bike check and set of lights will be on offer at the pit stops, beginning on 30 October at the junction of Pitfield Street and Hoxton Street.

Hackney's Try A Bike scheme is also being relaunched. Residents can now test out a bike for a month, as well as lights, panniers, a helmet, lock and bike seat, for just £10.

the bike can simply be returned, and the Try A Bike team will help residents find a discount at a local bike shop, source a reconditioned bike, or get help with using dockless or Santander bikes across the borough.

CLLr Feryal Demirci, Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods,

Transport and Parks, said: "As we go into winter, residents should take advantage of the drop-ins we're holding every month and the expert advice on offer at our cycle pit stops, not to mention the great freebies.

"It's so easy to cycle in Hackney all year round, and we're currently



DID YOU KNOW?

THE contribution of a key figure in mathematics and computing was marked with an international day of events that drew attention to inspirational women in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM).

Ada Lovelace Day on 10 October celebrated her pioneering work as the world's first computer programmer. Born in 1815, the daughter of infamous poet Lord Byron, she was a visionary mathematician who wrote the breakthrough program for Charles Babbage's proposed Analytical Engine, the world's first computer.

The machine was never built, but her notes were one of the crucial documents to inspire Alan Turing's work on the first modern computers in the 1940s. This in turn, helped to save Britain from defeat at the hands of Nazi Germany in World War Two. Turing was eradicated from history, however, because he was gay, Lovelace because she was a woman. Now both their stories are being retold and their rightful place in history restored.

Lovelace's name day aims to encourage more women to work in her field. Despite evidence that girls do well in STEM subjects at school, fewer go on to find jobs in the industry.

Cllr Carole Williams, Cabinet Member for Employment, Skills and Human Resources, said: "STEM subjects are the careers of the future and some of the biggest growth sectors in Hackney. We want to galvanise, empower and inspire young women to succeed in these areas."

At present, over 80 young people are in apprenticeships across the Council, and a number of advanced and higher apprenticeships in ICT are set to be introduced next year. There are also opportunities for 16 to 19-year-olds to kick-start their STEM careers with paid work experience through the Hackney 100 programme.





1. GRACE MEYER

SENIOR DATA SCIENTIST

After a degree in engineering, Grace had a number of roles in optimisation software and aviation analytics. She is now an analytics consultant and mentor in the R-Ladies community which supports other women into data science coding. She said: "Women are a minority in the data science industry. My team has 40 per cent women, which is great, although it is normal for me to be the only woman – and usually the youngest – in high level meetings."

2. LA BRAYA BUFFONG

DIGITAL MARKETING APPRENTICE

La Braya's role at the Council includes maintaining websites and distributing content across all communication channels. She said: "I'm the only female on my course. I've learnt a lot about how to manoeuvre in the digital world and I'm excited to see where I can go with it."

3. LUKE LUCAS

SPACECRAFT OPERATIONS ENGINEER

Luke works at the European Space Agency and is currently working on a spacecraft orbiting Mars. She said: "I've been responsible for controlling weather satellites, astronomy spacecraft and interplanetary spacecraft. I now fly a spacecraft around Mars. There are not many women in this industry, so there is definitely room for more."

4. OUR LADY'S HIGH SCHOOL STEM ACTIVITIES

Pupils have been taking part in STEM activities during the year including the #ICanEngineer competition held at the Institute of Civil Engineering.

5. DENISE HILL

CONTRACTS MANAGER

The first female electrical apprentice to receive the student of the year award in 1989, she has responsibility for managing electrical services on Hackney's housing estates. She said: "Engineering covers a range of different disciplines. I would hope that someone like me would inspire younger women to enter the construction industry, because we are too few."

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

Hackney is one of the most diverse places in the UK. In this regular feature, we profile the borough's great & good or just plain interesting

WHEN I got the call, asking us to work on Francois Hollande's presidential campaign I couldn't believe it was real," says Stoke Newington resident Guillaume Liegey.

He adds: "A year before, we had just been three guys living in the US. We hadn't known a single person in the Socialist Party. Now, here we were, about to step into the very centre of French politics.

"It was unbelievable... kind of a dream."

Liegey is CEO and co-founder of Liegey Muller Pons, a campaign technology company credited with helping to change the face of modern European politics.

It does so through technology: analysing data in order to pinpoint the neighbourhoods that are fertile grounds for a candidate, and then sending volunteers out to knock on the right doors.

Originally, Liegey thought he himself might want to be a politician.

He arrived at Harvard Kennedy School of Government in 2008, when Barack Obama's first presidential campaign was capturing the hearts of millions of Americans.

"It seemed like all of my classmates were volunteering, so I signed up too," says Liegey.

Which is how he ended up meeting a group of volunteers in a carpark,

being handed a list of addresses and asked to knock on those doors.

He says: "I wondered how they knew which addresses to approach. So I started asking questions."

The answer, of course, was data analytics.

"No one in France had ever used methods like that to refine door to door campaigns," he adds.

So when he met Vincent Pons and Arthur Muller, the two men who are now his business partners they decided to use these techniques and work with whoever was the progressive candidate in France's next election.

Since, as yet, they had not even formed a company, this was no minor ambition.

"It needed a lot of luck," says Liegey. But also, a lot of work. In 2010, with local elections happening in France, he explains.

"We tried to meet people who were running, and offer a small, Obama-style pilot."

They got lucky.


The Paris candidate accepted their help, they made a study of their work for him 'and, thankfully, it showed that it had worked', says Liegey.

When, in 2012, Francois Hollande was finally announced as the Socialist Party's presidential candidate the team reached out to everyone they could in his campaign team.

"At first, no one responded. And then, out of the blue, we got the call," he says.

The algorithm they

created for his campaign helped Hollande to defeat Nicolas Sarkozy and become France's new president. Buoyed by their success, Liegey, Muller and Pons started their eponymous company the very same year. But soon, another exciting opportunity arose.

"I had known Emmanuel Macron personally for about 10 years. We worked together

when I was at McKinsey and he was a civil servant," says Liegey. Far before he made his presidential bid official, Macron asked Liegey for his help.

He wanted to tour France, gathering people's real thoughts on their country and how it needed to change.

Liegey, Muller and Pons (LMP) sent 6,000

volunteers across the country, asking the same eight questions wherever they went.

By the time Macron founded his party, En Marche, in April 2016, they had a complete picture of the electorate in the form of 300,000 doors knocked on, and around 25,000 in-depth conversations.

"That's about three times the number of words in War and Peace," laughs Liegey. Macron went on to win the Presidential Election, while LMP opened new offices in Germany and Italy.

Liegey, however, continues to live in Stoke Newington, where he moved with his wife in 2011 and where they now raise their two daughters.

"My wife works in London and we thought it would be easier for me to travel," he says, explaining their decision to move here.

He adds: "Now, I love it and I wouldn't change a thing."

LMP is working with parties across Europe and as far away as Brazil.

"Most of them are progressive parties, but we are non-partisan, who I vote for should not effect who I work for," he explains.

"However, we would never work for a Brexit campaign," he says.

Stoke Newington, with its rich history in progressive politics, must be a perfect home for him.

He laughs: "It is, although the whole point of the Macron campaign, was to find out how people of all kinds think.

"Living in Stoke Newington, I have no idea how people who voted for Brexit think!"

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

All your green questions answered

Q: I have run out of food recycling bags and live in a block of flats – how do I get more?

A: Most households in Hackney receive food waste recycling collections from their doorstep or communal bins. The Council provides free liners to make recycling as clean and easy as possible.

It is especially important to use the liners in the communal bins on estates as it makes the bins cleaner and more hygienic for everyone.

By recycling food scraps and peelings, residents are diverting food from rubbish bins, reducing smells and vermin. They are also doing their bit for the environment, as food waste is turned into compost and used in Hackney's parks and gardens. 





HENNING WEHN once described himself as 'German comedy ambassador to the United Kingdom'.

His latest show, however, grapples with a subject that most diplomats would run a million miles from: the rights and wrongs of immigration.

The familiar face (and unmistakable voice) from *Have I Got News For You* and *Live at The Apollo*, is coming to the Hackney Empire with his show *Westphalia is not an Option*.

Kicking off with Brexit, he marches cheerfully through controversial issues


IN what must have been a truly 'out of this world' experience, three Hackney students rubbed shoulders with an astronaut at their college's awards ceremony.

A LOCAL project designed to alleviate loneliness among the terminally ill has won the latest in a series of awards and accolades.

The Compassionate Neighbours programme, run by St Joseph's Hospice, won the prestigious Community Award at the Charity Times Awards on 4 October.

Matching volunteers with people in the community who live with a chronic or terminal illness, the programme aims to provide support and companionship

to those who are otherwise extremely isolated.

The model has proved so successful that in March the project received over £200,000 in funding in order to expand across London. More than 400 volunteers are now being trained to support its growth.

Residents urged to take up the offer of free flu vaccine

A WINTER health campaign has been launched in Hackney this month to tie in with the national flu vaccination programme.

It is hoped the Public Health England and NHS joint 'Stay Well This Winter' campaign will help the most vulnerable people in the borough avoid having to visit hospital due to common winter illnesses.

The programme launched as the country's Chief Medical Officer, Professor Dame Sally Davies, warned that flu, and complications associated with it, cause 8,000 deaths on average a year in England.

This year's campaign aims to continue to increase uptake of the flu vaccination. It is offered to those who are at increased risk from the effects of the illness. These include children aged two to eight; people aged 65 and over; pregnant women and those with long term health conditions.

Professor Davies said: "Flu kills and we could save thousands of lives if everyone eligible got their free jab.

"With more people eligible than ever before and the vaccine available in more locations, people should protect themselves and those around them against this potentially deadly virus.

"Taking a few minutes to get the jab could save your life this winter."

MP reveals personal interest in mental wellbeing

DIANE Abbott, MP for Hackney North and Stoke Newington, sent a message of support to those attending an event in the borough on World Mental Health Day.

In her message at the 10 October event, run by the City and Hackney Psychological Therapies and Wellbeing Alliance, she

said: "Mental health is an issue I take great personal interest in.

"My mother was a mental health nurse and there have been mental health issues in my family."

"It still remains the case that we all have to work hard to make sure that all groups, including the most vulnerable get access to the

mental health care they need."

Dan Burningham, Programme Director for Mental Health at the City and Hackney CCG, said: "A key benefit of the alliance has been the voluntary sector and NHS collaboration, which has enabled us to pilot new approaches to

better engage black and minority ethnic and refugee communities, and increase access to therapies within different communities.

"Recovery rates have been improving. For example, recovery rates for our Turkish population have moved from below 40 per cent to above 50 per cent."

As part of the Council's wider programme to support young black men, it has recently commissioned mental health first aid training for frontline service staff, especially those that work closely with this group.




IN the decade since it opened, Dalston CLR James Library has established itself as a hub for local cultural expression. Indeed, it hosts a number of Black History Season events this very month.

However, the site on which it stands also has a rich cultural history. Many people will know it as the spot inhabited by legendary 1960s haunt The Four Aces Club and then Club Labyrinth until the end of the last millennium.

But No. 12 Dalston Lane's cultural legacy stretches back over more than a century. To 1886, in fact, when The Dalston Theatre was built there (then called Rosebury Place) to house Robert Fossett's Grand Circus. The huge space, said to seat over 1,000 people, changed names and uses several times as people's cultural habits changed.

Early on, it was referred to as the North London Colosseum. It converted to a cinema in 1920 and was renamed the Dalston Picture House (later the Gaumont).



By the early 1960s, the building had been split into a warehouse and car auction space, but it was in the foyer that a club set up predominately for Hackney's Afro-Caribbean community carried on the cultural legacy.

In 1966, Newton Dunbar's keen ear for music and head for business brought an entirely new audience to the space, by helping to establish The Four Aces Club.

He had actually started the club in a basement in Highbury Grove, but relocated to a space large enough to accommodate a rapidly growing clientele.

The Four Aces quickly became an important meeting point for Caribbean communities living in the borough and beyond.

It also served as a magnet

for leading performers from the Caribbean and US, as well as homegrown stars.

The roster from the late 1960s to the 1980s included Desmond Dekker, Jimmy Cliff, Alton Ellis, Prince Buster, The Upsetters, Ann Peebles, Percy Sledge, Ben E King, Toots and the Maytals, The Skatalites and Dennis Brown.

They rubbed shoulders with the likes of Bob Marley, Chrissie Hynde, Mick Jagger, Marc Bolan,

Bob Dylan, Debbie Harry, Billy Ocean and The Clash.

However, the stresses of keeping a black music venue open began to tell on Dunbar. Police harassment was becoming the norm.

He would take a lower profile role, as the club shifted gear by joining forces with dance club Labyrinth to create the first legal indoor rave venture.

The move would see fans from Birmingham, Sheffield and even Paris visit to lap

up a diet of acid house, hardcore rave and jungle. It would also provide the springboard for dance music giants The Prodigy.

Despite this, a compulsory purchase order for a cinema forced the club to close its doors for good in 1999.

The cinema proposal fell through however and campaigners fought hard to save the venue, but it was demolished to make way for residential housing and

the new Dalston CLR James Library in 2007. And yet the legend of The Four Aces Club continues to flourish.

As well as blogs and print articles and the tireless work of Dunbar himself, the legacy of the Four Aces continues to burn bright.

Hackney Archives will be showing 'Legacy in the Dust: The Four Aces Story', a documentary film by Winstan Whitter about the history of the club until the end of November.

The Mayor and councillors

Councillors are elected by residents and serve for four years. The last borough-wide elections took place in May 2014. Councillors have a range of responsibilities, including helping to oversee Council services.

They hold advice surgeries where residents can meet their local representative and ask them to take up issues of concern. Generally they can help with Council related matters, but if the issue is the responsibility of another


person or organisation, councillors can often point people in the right direction and tell residents who they need to see. Hackney has 57 councillors representing areas called wards – see map below.

Hackney's executive **Mayor Philip Glanville** was directly elected by the borough in 2016. He is the political leader of the Council, overseeing the budget and all Council services. Residents are first encouraged to contact their ward councillor. Civic and ceremonial duties are undertaken by the Speaker of Hackney, who is chosen annually from the borough's 57 councillors. Carbonara

Serves 2

Preparation time 30 mins

- 100g pancetta/bacon, sliced into lardons
- 50g Parmesan, grated
- 2 eggs
- 20g chopped parsley
- 5 shallots, finely sliced
- 4 cloves of garlic, finely diced
- 15g thyme, finely chopped
- 25g butter.
- 150g tagliatelle pasta

Method

- In a big mixing bowl, crack the eggs and whisk
- Add the Parmesan and chopped parsley
- Cook the pasta in a pot of boiling water for 6-10 mins until al dente
- In a sauté pan, cook the pancetta for 2-3 mins on medium heat
- Then add the shallots and sweat them until translucent
- Add the thyme and garlic and cook for a further 2 mins
- Stir in the pasta and combine all ingredients. Serve and enjoy.
